

Part 1 Crimes

Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) guidelines track eight "Index Crimes," known also as Part 1 crimes. The UCR system includes crimes that are most likely to be reported to the police and to occur with sufficient frequency to provide an adequate basis for comparison. Part 1 crimes are further split into two categories, **Violent** and **Property**. Below is analysis of Part 1 crimes reported to Public Safety (*The below percentage change is a comparison of 2020 to 2021*):



Public Safety conducted a total of $\underline{71}$ traffic related events during 2021 at various locations throughout the city and as a result $\underline{536}$ citations were issued and $\underline{31}$ were charged. Checkpoints include seat belt enforcement, saturated patrols, speed enforcement and educational events.



Training




- Total police-related training for 2021 was <u>4,373</u> hours, resulting in each sworn officer (60) averaging <u>73</u> hours of training
- Total fire-related training was <u>11,754</u> hours, resulting in each firefighter (90) averaging <u>130</u> hours of training for the year

Drug Enforcement:

The mission of the Public Safety *Narcotics Division* is drug interdiction and enforcement, below is a summary of their activity for 2021:

The hard work of our Narcotics Division resulted in $\underline{129}$ felony drug cases (3 Federal cases) with $\underline{81}$ indictments (8 Federal) and $\underline{96}$ individuals charged. Furthermore, over $\underline{\$41,000}$ in cash was seized, of which our department receives 75% (\\$30,967), as well as $\underline{8}$ weapons were also seized during investigations.

Special Weapons And Tactics (SWAT)



Public Safety's SWAT team is comprised of 10 members and is responsible for hostage situations, barricaded persons, sniper incidents, aggravated suicide attempts, high-risk building searches & arrest warrant service, crowd control and other potential life threatening incidents which exceed the routine response of onduty Public Safety personnel. The team conducted 5 operations in 2021 as well as monthly training events.

K9 Program:

As a result of staffing issues, our canine program was limited in 2021. PSO Gabryszewski completed his 10-week Handler training and then trained and oriented his newly-assigned canine TIGO and PSO Huffman, who is assigned canine JAROS, was on light duty for five months of 2021. Canine units are responsible for apprehension of fleeing suspects, article searches, tracking suspects or missing persons, building searches, and narcotics detection. Below is their activity for 2021:

Explorers Program:

In 2021 Public Safety continued its *Law Enforcement Explorers* program which is a hands-on career-oriented program that gives youth from ages 14 to 21 years old the opportunity to explore careers in law enforcement and firefighting. We ended the year with <u>10</u> youth participating in our bi-weekly program supervised by our personnel. The Explorers assisted our Community Services Division with community projects which included our annual Blue Elves toy giveaway.



Community Services Division:

"Coffee With A Cop" is a national event that focuses on connecting community members with Law Enforcement. In 2021 Public Safety hosted <u>7</u> events at businesses. The program continues to be well received by members in the community.



• "Operation Safe Haven" provided a week-long summer camp in 2021 for <u>17</u> students who successfully completed the D.A.R.E. program



- In 2021 our D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) program was presented to 5th graders at New Dimensions School, Morganton Day School and home school groups with 48 students completing the program. The D.A.R.E. curriculum uses national research based educational techniques to teach youth better decision making skills to help them avoid negative influences in life.
- Public Safety's annual "Blue Elves" outreach event reached nearly <u>175</u> children in the city of Morganton with assistance from The Marine Corps League Toys for Tots, Morganton Housing Authority, Morganton-Burke Fraternal Order of Police, Morganton Recreation Department and other donors. These partnerships have allowed Public Safety to facilitate this event which includes toys, snacks and activities for youth and parents.



Fire Services:

Fire Prevention efforts included presentations to more than <u>1,800</u> citizens at <u>13</u> different events throughout the year totaling <u>37</u> man-hours. Events were held at local elementary schools, recreation centers and community events and included information on fire prevention and life safety. Conducted <u>4</u> tours of our facilities for our citizens allowing them to observe the specialized equipment used in firefighting. Assisted hearing-impaired citizens with proper installation of smoke detectors and bed-shaker alarms. Performed <u>37</u> events assisting citizens with correct child car seat installations.



Breast Cancer Awareness

Public Safety showed its support in the fight against breast cancer by designing and selling t-shirts and patches during October's *Breast Cancer Awareness Month* and raising/donating over \$3,200 to Blue Ridge Healthcare Foundation to help fund mammograms for those in need.



Autism Awareness

To show our support during *Autism Awareness Month* in April, Public Safety designed and sold patches and raised over \$1,200 in 2021which was given to North Liberty School to further their autism programs.
