

#### **NIBRS Crime Statistics**


In 2021, the FBI implemented the National Incident-Based Reporting System, NIBRS, replacing UCR to improve the overall quality of crime data collected by law enforcement. Unlike data reported through the UCR Program—an aggregate monthly tally of crimes—NIBRS goes much deeper due to its ability to provide circumstances and context for crimes like location, time of day, and whether the incident was cleared. Not only does NIBRS look at all of the offenses within an incident, but it also looks at many more offenses than the traditional SRS does. NIBRS collects data for 52 offenses, plus 10 additional offenses for which only arrests are reported.



## Training




- Total police-related training for 2023 was 6,885 hours, resulting in each sworn officer (59) averaging 117 hours of training

## Special Events and Highlights

#### Special Weapons And Tactics (SWAT):

Public Safety's SWAT team is comprised of 10 members and is responsible for hostage situations, barricaded persons, crisis negotiations, aggravated suicide attempts, high-risk building searches & arrest warrant services, sniper incidents, crowd control and other potential life threatening incidents which exceed the routine response of on-duty Public Safety personnel. During 2023, the SWAT team completed monthly specialized tactical training and conducted 5 call-out operations. These operations included a stand-off with an armed barricaded suspect with active warrants for arrest for possession of weapons of mass destruction as well as the execution of multiple high-



risk warrant services of persons believed to be in the possession of narcotics and firearms. The SWAT team worked jointly with the Burke County Sheriff's Office SWAT team and Narcotics Task Force during multiple operations.

#### **Community Services Division:**

Community Services was part of over 100 special events, presentations, K9 Demos, and other community oriented activities throughout 2023 and it is anticipated to exceed that number in 2024.



"Coffee With A Cop" is a national event that focuses on connecting community members with Law Enforcement. In 2023, Public Safety hosted <u>6</u> events at businesses. The program continues to be well received by members in the community.



Public Safety's annual "Blue Elves" outreach event reached nearly <u>95</u> children in the city of Morganton, with assistance of over 40 volunteers made up of The Marine Corps League Toys for Tots, Morganton Housing Authority, Morganton-Burke Fraternal Order of Police, Morganton Recreation Department and other donors. These partnerships have allowed Public Safety to facilitate this event which includes toys, snacks and activities for youth and parents

# Special Events and Highlights Continued

#### Explorers Program:



In 2023 Public Safety continued its Law Enforcement Explorers program which is a hands-on career-oriented program that gives youth from ages 14 to 21 years old the opportunity to explore careers in law enforcement and firefighting. We ended the year with **8** youth participating in the program. Explorers assisted our Community Services Division with community projects which included our annual Blue Elves toy giveaway, Spooky Meadows Haunted Trail, Historic Morganton Festival and Parades.


#### Fire Services:

Fire Prevention efforts included presentations to more than **5,402** citizens at **24** different events throughout the year totaling **105.5** contact-hours. Events were held at local elementary schools, recreation centers and community events. These events included information on fire prevention and life safety. We installed **100** smoke detectors, assisted hearing-impaired citizens with proper installation of smoke detectors and bed-shaker alarms. Performed **14** events assisting citizens on how to correctly install child car seats.





## Special Events and Highlights Continued



#### Citizens Public Safety Academy

Citizens Public Safety Academy is a three month program for community members. The class meets weekly and discusses topics that are relevant to our agency. Each meeting includes: classroom instruction, hands-on activities and an invitation for the members to speak with public safety personnel and ask questions. The goal is for our community to have a better understanding of how Morganton Public Safety operates on a daily basis. At the end of 12 weeks, the participants attend a graduation banquet and receive a certificate of completion.

#### Safe Haven Camp

Safe Haven Summer Camp is an annual weeklong camp hosted by Morganton Department of Public Safety. The Camp allows rising 6th grade students the opportunity to interact with Public Safety Personnel. During the camp we focus on instilling the fundamentals of being drug free, antibullying tactics and emphasize being an asset to the community. In 2023, 20 children participated in Safe Haven. Participants take part in a local service project, outdoor activities, emergency services presentations and a trip to a local amusement park. At the end of the week, the camp is brought to a close with a banquet for campers and their families.



#### Fund it Forward

#### **Breast Cancer Awareness**

Public Safety showed its support in the fight against breast cancer by designing and selling t-shirts and patches during October's *Breast Cancer Awareness Month.* We raised over \$1,400, which was donated to Blue Ridge Healthcare Foundation and will be used to help fund mammograms for those in need.





#### **Autism Awareness**

To show our support during *Autism Awareness Month* in April, Public Safety designed and sold patches. The autism patches raised \$1,500 in 2023 and the money was donated to North Liberty School to further their autism programs.
