



Part 1 Crimes

Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) guidelines track eight "Index Crimes," known also as Part 1 crimes. The UCR system includes crimes that are most likely to be reported to the police and to occur with sufficient frequency to provide an adequate basis for comparison. Part 1 crimes are further split into two categories, **Violent** and **Property**. Below is analysis of Part 1 crimes reported to Public Safety (*The below percentage change is a comparison of 2015 to 2016*):







Training

Public Safety provides police and fire services for the city and as such we are required to maintain training standards for both disciplines. Below is a summary:



- Total police-related training for 2016 was 5,628 hours, resulting in each sworn officer (66) averaging 85 hours of training
- Total fire-related training was 9,525 hours, resulting in each firefighter (90) averaging 106 hours of training for the year
- Two personnel attended the WPCC Fire Academy at 464 hours each



Departmental Highlights

Drug Enforcement:

Public Safety is a member of the *Burke County Narcotics Task Force*, whose mission is drug interdiction and enforcement, below is a summary of activity for 2016 (2016 in parentheses):

Initiated 357 cases (327), resulting in 235 arrests (169) and 160 indictments (98)

Seizures; \$65,023 in cash (\$60,468), 36 weapons (22), 1 vehicle and \$53,817 in narcotics

The following are amounts for the major drug categories that were seized:

Cocaine: 73 gramsCrack: 163 grams

o Marijuana: 10,268 grams (22.6 lbs.)

Methamphetamines: 2,285 gramsLiquid Meth.: 922 cc

Oxycodone: 264 dosage unitsHydrocodone: 183 dosage units

Canine:

Our canine program is comprised of two handlers each assigned to a canine, PSO William Miller assigned to canine Kimo and PSO Stacey Huffman assigned canine Shrek. Canine Units are responsible for apprehension of fleeing suspects, article searches, i.e., finding items suspects may have thrown during a chase, tracking suspects or missing persons, building searches and narcotics detection. Furthermore, they conduct demonstrations in the community and assist surrounding agencies.

Special Weapons And Tactics (SWAT)

Public Safety's SWAT team is comprised of 10 members and is responsible for hostage situations, barricaded persons, sniper incidents, aggravated suicide attempts, high-risk building searches & arrest warrant service, crowd control and other potential life threatening incidents which exceed the routine response of on-duty Public Safety personnel. Criteria for team selection is: one year law enforcement experience, demonstrate ability to conduct oneself calmly & effectively under stressful situations, minimum qualifying score of 94% with each assigned duty weapon, no disciplinary action in past 2 years, display initiative, obligation to the public safety profession, officer's compatibility with current members of the SWAT team, good physical condition and pass the rigorous physical fitness test and final approval is from the Chief. Below are highlights from 2016:



- 8 call-outs which include stand-offs, executing high-risk warrants as well as assisting the Burke County Narcotics Task Force and Burke County Sheriff's Office
- Sgt. Ben Carswell was added to our SWAT in 2016

Special Operations Division:

"Coffee With A Cop" is a national event that focuses on connecting community members with Law Enforcement. In 2016, Public Safety hosted this event at ten businesses and has been well received by members in the community. The department has hosted, and received requests, from the following: Pat's Snack Bar, Grace Ridge Retirement Community, The Grind coffee shop, My Local Bakery, Denny's, Allison's restaurant, and more



- In 2016, our D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) program was presented over a 3-month period to 5th graders at the following elementary schools; Mountain Crest, Forest Hill, New Dimensions and home school groups. The D.A.R.E. curriculum uses national research-based educational techniques to teach youth better decision making skills to help them avoid negative influences in life
- Public Safety's Annual "Blue Elves" toy drive reached over 300 children in the city of Morganton with assistance from The Marine Corps League and Morganton Housing Authority. By forming these partnerships Public Safety was able to facilitate a larger event which included toys, snacks and department-led activities for the youth and parents. Additional toys were donated to The Outreach Center



- *Operation Safe Haven" provided a week-long summer camp for rising 6th graders in city schools as a reward for those who successfully completed the D.A.R.E. program and included the following activities:
 - o Team-building activities with local fire and law enforcement
 - o Fun Depot in Asheville; games, go-carts and laser tag
 - Swimming and canoeing at Lake James State Park
 - Carowinds and Boomerang Bay Water Park
 - Community service projects, i.e., a Treasure Hunt in downtown Morganton that challenged teams to collect the most amount of trash by weight
 - Meals & transportation the entire week
 - Awards Banquet with a meal for the children's families



Traffic Checkpoints:

Public Safety conducted a total of <u>60</u> traffic checkpoints during 2016 (six included the state *Blood Alcohol Testing* mobile) at various locations throughout the city resulting in <u>765</u> charges, of which <u>92</u> involved narcotics and <u>17</u> fugitives were apprehended.

Fire Prevention:

Fire Prevention efforts included presentations to more than 1,100 citizens at 18 different events throughout the year. Events were held at local elementary schools, recreation centers and community events and included information on fire prevention and life safety.

Breast Cancer Awareness

Public Safety showed its support in the fight against breast cancer by designing and selling t-shirts during October's *Breast Cancer Awareness Month* and raising/donating over \$2,500 to Blue Ridge Healthcare Foundation to help fund mammograms for those in need.



Sanctuary Safety Workshop

In an effort to inform and equip local churches in defending against potential active-shooter incidents, Public Safety conducted two "Sanctuary Safety Workshops" in 2016. The primary purpose was to inform and educate attendees about the need for churches to have an Emergency Operations Plan in place prior to an incident occurring and to offer assistance in helping church leadership develop those plans. It was attended by nearly 150 citizens.



N.C. Supreme Court

In May of 2016 the N.C. Supreme Court held two sessions at the Old Burke County Courthouse in Morganton for the first time in over 150 years. The court held its August sessions in Morganton from 1847-1862. Public Safety was privileged to be a part of this historic event.
