

Part 1 Crimes

Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) guidelines track eight "Index Crimes," known also as Part 1 crimes. The UCR system includes crimes that are most likely to be reported to the police and to occur with sufficient frequency to provide an adequate basis for comparison. Part 1 crimes are further divided into two categories, **Violent** and **Property**. Below is analysis of Part 1 crimes reported to Public Safety (*The below percentage change is a comparison of 2017 to 2018*):



Training



- Total police-related training for 2018 was <u>5,385</u> hours, resulting in each sworn officer (60) averaging <u>90</u> hours of training
- Total fire-related training was <u>11,521</u> hours, resulting in each firefighter (90) averaging <u>128</u> hours of training for the year
- 7 personnel attended the WPCC Fire Academy at 464 hours each



SWAT (Special Weapons & Tactics)



Public Safety's **SWAT** team is comprised of 10 members and is responsible for; hostage situations, barricaded persons, sniper incidents, aggravated suicide attempts, high-risk building searches & arrest warrant service, crowd control and other potential life threatening incidents that exceed the routine response of on-duty Public Safety personnel. SWAT highlights from 2018:

■ 11 call-outs to include stand-offs, executing high-risk warrants and assisting the Burke County Narcotics Task Force and Burke County Sheriff's Office

K9 (Canine)

Our canine program is comprised of two handlers each assigned to a K9. PSO William Miller retired K9 Kimo due to health issues and recently purchased a new canine – Radar. PSO Stacey Huffman handles K9 Jaros and due to Kimo's health issues for a good part of 2018 was the only canine available. Canine units are responsible for apprehension of fleeing suspects, article searches, tracking suspects or missing persons, building searches and narcotics detection.





Special Events/Section Highlights

2018 Citizen Police Academy:



In 2018 Public Safety hosted its second annual *Citizen Police Academy*. A 13-week community-oriented program that offers participants the chance to learn more about public safety. The goal of the Academy is to open lines of communication between citizens and Public Safety so that participants are better informed about what the police profession entails. A graduation ceremony was held at the CoMMA recognizing 15 participants pictured below.



Explorers Program – Post 226:

In 2018 Public Safety continued its *Law Enforcement Explorers* program. A hands-on career-oriented program that gives youth from 6th grade to 20 years old the opportunity to explore careers in law enforcement and firefighting. In 2018, 15 youth participated in our bi-weekly program supervised by Public Safety personnel.



Community Services

"Coffee With A Cop" is a national event that focuses on connecting community members with Law Enforcement. In 2018 Public Safety hosted this event at ten businesses including The Grind, CHS Blue Ridge, Pat's Snack Bar, Allison's Family Restaurant and Chick-Fil-A.



- In 2018 our **D.A.R.E.** (**Drug Abuse Resistance Education**) program was presented to 5th graders at New Dimensions School, Morganton Day School and at Morganton Public Safety Headquarters to several groups of Burke County homeschoolers. The D.A.R.E. curriculum uses national research based educational techniques to teach youth better decision making skills to help them avoid negative influences in life.
- Public Safety's annual "Blue Elves" toy drive reached nearly 250 children in the city of Morganton with assistance from The Marine Corps League Toys for Tots, Morganton Housing Authority, Morganton-Burke Fraternal Order of Police and other donors. These partnerships have allowed Public Safety to facilitate an event that includes toys, snacks and activities for youth and parents. Additional toys were donated to The Outreach Center where over 500 families were assisted with food, clothing and toys.
- **Operation Safe Haven"** provided a week-long summer camp for children who successfully completed the D.A.R.E. program:
 - Team-building activities with local fire and law enforcement
 - Fun Depot in Asheville; games, go-carts and laser tag
 - Swimming and canoeing at Lake James State Park
 - Carowinds and Carolina Harbor Waterpark
 - Community service projects
 - Meals & transportation the entire week
 - Awards Banquet with a meal for the children's families



Traffic Checkpoints:

Public Safety conducted <u>63</u> traffic checkpoints during 2018 at various locations throughout the city resulting in citations and arrests.

Fire Prevention:

Fire Prevention efforts included presentations to more than <u>5,000</u> citizens at <u>41</u> different events throughout the year. Events were at local elementary schools, recreation centers and community events and included information on fire prevention and life safety. Tours of our facilities were also conducted allowing citizens to observe the specialized equipment used in firefighting. This division also assisted hearing-impaired citizens with proper installation of smoke detectors.

Breast Cancer Awareness

Public Safety showed its support in the fight against breast cancer by designing and selling t-shirts and keychains during October's *Breast Cancer Awareness Month* and raising/donating over \$2,300 to Blue Ridge Healthcare Foundation to help fund mammograms for those in need.



Active Shooter Training



In an effort to inform and equip local businesses in defending against potential active-shooter incidents, Public Safety conducted six training presentations in 2018. The primary purpose was to inform and educate businesses about the need for an Emergency Operations Plan in place prior to an incident occurring and to offer assistance in helping develop those plans.

Partnership for Change

In October 2017, Morganton Department of Public Safety formed a group comprised of faith-based, education, medical and law enforcement leaders in an effort to build relationships through transparency, communication, trust and networking. Bringing leaders together face to face at a time when the community needs to know and understand what we all have in common and how we can overcome our differences is already making a positive impact.

In 2018, the group has continued to meet on a quarterly basis with each meeting highlighting an area of concern in our community including Drug Addiction, Mental Health, Education, Community Relations and Building Family Leadership.
